

In 1997, 552 of us graduated with \$64,000 in average student debt and approximately 90% of us went first to a law firm or a clerkship.




Employment Statistics 1997



While a majority moved to New York, California, or DC, we collectively touched most states.







Only half of us still work in a field we define as legal.


In what field do you now work?




Have you wanted to quit a job?

Only 10% of us have been fired.


Have you been fired from a job since graduating HLS?





So, about 60% of us have had 4 or more jobs since graduating.


Since leaving HLS, how many jobs have you held?



One thing you learned at HLS that helped you the most

- Critical legal thinking
- The ability to read, write and think critically
- Be resilient and flexible. What got you here won't get you to the next benchmark
- Networking
- How to speak in front of a crowd -- including how to survive saying something less than brilliant in front of a crowd!
- That fine print and legalese matters and can have enormous impact
- Confidence. Confidence that I could learn the job. Confidence that I could do the job. Confidence that I could impact the world in a positive way
- Preparation almost always wins the day
- Attention to detail
- Asking the right question is more important than getting the right answer to the wrong question
 Patience
- Recognizing that people with opposing views may feel equally strongly
- and have equal strong basis for their views Research skills
- Not to be intimidated by anyone. Invaluable
- Critical thinking; being able to see and articulate both sides of an argument
- · How to marshall an argument
- If you have a big enough group, pretty much everything that could happens does
- Think through issues deeply
- Your most precious asset is time
- Only good things come out of hard work
- •Try to make the most of every opportunity because I don't think I was mature enough to do that when I was at HLS!
- •The criminal justice system is rigged against poor people and people of color

- Even smart, powerful people can be wrong and/or funny. (So I should never take myself too seriously - but never take myself not seriously enough)
- Negotiation skills
- To believe in and value my intellect
- •That I can (almost) master anything I put my mind to
- •That some lawyers are brilliant but most are insipid
- •To always look at any issue from the other side
- •To be a critical thinker
- Ignore the annoying people
- You cant take it all too seriously. you always have to have some outlet and be able to do something other than the law if you are going to thrive and survive
- How to think about an issue objectively
- •The importance of taking your work seriously as something more than just a job
- How to be a good teammate when you play with a compulsive ball hog (Plus critical thinking / problem disaggregation)
- How to argue both sides of any position
- Persuasive writing
- •Things aren't always what they seem
- Confidence
- How to write effectively and succinctly
- How to engage difficult people in debate in difficult situations, and persuade or influence them
- Prepare
- Not to underestimate the law as a tool for social change
- Confidence that I can compete with the best
- •The order of importance is the money, the relationship and then the law
- Getting to Yes

- That I was smart enough to belong. If I could compete with the best and brightest at HLS, that I can compete and do well in anything I choose to do
- You can always make at least two, contrary arguments from a given set of facts and law.
- My first year negotiation seminar was invaluable

The Boston Blobe

Three lives linked by call to duty, common tragedy

The sacrifices of Harvard Law graduates who took unconventional paths leave friends and classmates searching for answers about themselves



Michael Weston, Helge Boes, and Cynthia Tidler lived a few doors down from one another in Ames Hall in their first year of law school. They were fueled by a different inner fire

WASHINGTON - They were three best friends at Harvard Law School who turned their backs on lucrative careers to follow an exceedingly rare path: Michael Weston, who jogged through Harvard Yard in combat boots and openly scorned corporate life, joined the Marines. Helge Boes and his girlfriend Cynthia Tidler, who shared their friend's sense of duty and adventure, joined the CIA.

Their choices - made out of passion, patrictism, and an urge to live an unconventional life - intertwined their fates.

Hoes, a covert CIA operative, died when a grenade went off during training in Afghanistan in 2003, leaving Tidler, whom he had married after school, a widow. In their grief, Weston and Tidler reconnected and married earlier last year. Three months later, Weston deployed to Afghanistan; he died there in October, in a helicopter crash, widowing Tidler once again.

In law school, their interest in military and intelligence work made them oddities to many classmates. Now, in law firms and investment banks across the country, some who knew them are questioning their own career choices. Indeed, their friends said, the close relationship of the three, their commitment to confront America's enemies, and the tragic are of their lives underscore how rare it is for people with privileged educations to volunteer to fight America's wars.

"To see people who could have done anything making that kind of sacrifice, it is hard not to look inward and ask, 'What kind of sacrifices are you making?' " said Rob Simmelkjaer, a former dissumate who is now a vice president at LSPN in Now York.

"I think there are a lot of people who see two guys who really gave the ultimate sacrifice," said John Carsy, a partner at Patterson & Sheridan in Palo Alto, Calif. "And there is a lot of guilt."






