Chiraag Bains is the Director of Legal Strategies at Demos and a visiting senior fellow at HLS's Criminal Justice Policy Program. Previously, he served as senior counsel to the Assistant Attorney General of the Civil Rights Division at DOJ, where he helped lead the Division's criminal justice reform work and supervise its Special Litigation, Voting, Housing, and Appellate Sections. He was also a member of the team that sued Ferguson, Missouri, for unconstitutional police and court practices. Prior to that, he prosecuted excessive force, hate crimes, and other civil rights offenses in the Division's Criminal Section. Bains clerked for Judges Karen Nelson Moore on the Sixth Circuit and Nancy Gertner in the District of Massachusetts. At HLS, he was an articles editor on the Harvard Law Review and a student defender with the Criminal Justice Institute. He received his M.Phil. in criminology from the University of Cambridge and his BA from Yale.

Adam J. Bookbinder '93

Aisha's close to 20-year career has spanned diverse legal work focused on corporate transactions, risk management, data privacy, corporate counseling and employment/HR in the media/entertainment, technology, consumer products, professional services and ecommerce/retail industries.

As Rent the Runway's first General Counsel, Aisha led all aspects of the company's legal affairs. I. Glenn Cohen '03

Prof. Cohen is one of the world's leading experts on the intersection of bioethics (sometimes also called "medical ethics") and the law, as well as health law. He also teaches civil procedure. From Seoul to Krakow to Vancouver, Professor Cohen has spoken at legal, medical, and industry conferences around the world and his work has appeared in or been covered on PBS, NPR, ABC, CNN, MSNBC, Mother Jones, the New York Times, the New Republic, the Boston Globe, and several other media venues.

He was the youngest professor on the faculty at Harvard Law School (tenured or untenured) both when he joined the faculty in 2008 (at age 29) and when he was tenured as a full professor in 2013 (at age 34), though not the youngest in history.

Prof. Cohen's current projects relate to big data, health information technologies, mobile health, reproduction/reproductive technology, research ethics, organ transplantation, rationing in law and medicine, health policy, FDA law, translational medicine, and to medical tourism - the travel of patients who are residents of one country, the "home country," to another country, the "destination country," for medical treatment.

He is the author of more than 100 articles and chapters and his award-winning work has appeared in leading legal (including the Stanford, Cornell, and Southern California Law Reviews), medical (including the New England Journal of Medicine, JAMA), bioethics (including the American Journal of Bioethics, the Hastings Center Report), scientific (Science, Cell, Nature Reviews Genetics) and public health (the American Journal of Public Health) journals, as well as Op-Eds in the New York Times and Washington Post.

Cohen is the author, co-author, editor, or co-editor of 12 books. They include: Health Care Law and Ethics (Aspen, 2018); Big Data, Health Law, and Bioethics (Cambridge University Press, 2018); Specimen Science (MIT Press, 2017); The Oxford Handbook of U.S. Health Care Law (Oxford University Press, 2016); FDA in the Twenty-First Century: The Challenges of Regulating Drugs and New Technologies (Columbia University Press, 2015); Identified Versus Statistical Lives: An Interdisciplinary Perspective (Oxford University Press, 2015); Patients with Passports: Medical Tourism, Law, and Ethics (Oxford University Press, 2014); Human Subjects Research Regulation: Perspectives on the Future (MIT Press, 2014); The Globalization of Health Care: Legal and Ethical Issues (Oxford University Press, 2013).

For his law school teaching he was awarded the HLS Student Government Teaching and Advising Award in 2017. He also sometimes teaches courses at Harvard College and Harvard Medical School. For the public he created the free online Harvard X class Bioethics: The Law, Medicine, and Ethics of Reproductive Technologies and Genetics.

Prior to becoming a professor he served as a law clerk to Judge Michael Boudin of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the First Circuit and as a lawyer for US Department of Justice, Civil Division, Appellate Staff, where he handled litigation in the Courts of Appeals and (in conjunction with the Solicitor General's Office) in the U.S. Supreme Court. In his spare time (where he can find any!) he still litigates, having authored an amicus brief in the US Supreme Court for leading gene scientist Eric Lander in Association of Molecular Pathology v. Myriad, concerning whether human genes are patent eligible subject matter, a brief that was extensively discussed by the Justices at oral argument. Most recently he submitted an amicus brief to the U.S. Supreme Court in Whole Women's Health v. Hellerstedt (the Texas abortion case, on behalf of himself, Melissa Murray, and B. Jessie Hill).

Cohen was selected as a Radcliffe Institute Fellow for the 2012-2013 year and by the Greenwall Foundation to receive a Faculty Scholar Award in Bioethics. He is also a Fellow at the Hastings Center, the leading bioethics think tank in the United States. He recently finished his role as one of the key co-investigators on a multi-million Football Players Health Study at Harvard which is committed to improving the health of NFL players (for more on this work click here). He leads the Ethics and Law initiative as part of the multi-million dollar NIH funded Harvard Catalyst | The Harvard Clinical and Translational Science Center program, and the Project on Precision Medicine, Artificial Intelligence, and the Law (PMAIL). He is also one of three editors-in-chief of the Journal of Law and the Biosciences, a peer-reviewed journal published by Oxford University Press and serves on the editorial board for the American Journal of Bioethics. He served on the Steering Committee for Ethics for the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR), the Canadian counterpart to the NIH, and currently serves and on the Ethics Committee for the American Congress of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG).

Jeffrey H. Cohen '88

Mr. Jeffrey Cohen is a Managing Director and Vice Chairman of Global Retail of Credit Suisse in the Investment Banking and Capital Markets, Retail and Consumer division, based in New York City.

Jeff joined Credit Suisse in March 2016 from Lazard where he was Global Head of Retail, prior to that he was Global Head of Retail at UBS as well as Wasserstein Perella.

Jeff holds a JD degree from Harvard Law School, as well as a BS in Economics from the Wharton School and a BA from the College of Arts and Sciences at the University of Pennsylvania. Jeff serves on the Harvard Law School Leadership Council.

Andrew Crespo '08

Andrew Manuel Crespo is an Assistant Professor of Law at Harvard Law School, where he teaches criminal law and criminal procedure. Professor Crespo's research focuses on the institutional design and administration of the criminal justice system, with a particular focus on the administrative role courts play in regulating law enforcement behavior. His recent article, Systemic Facts, was published in the Harvard Law Review and was honored by the AALS Criminal Justice Section as the best paper on criminal justice issues written by a tenure-track professor in 2015. An earlier article, Regaining Perspective, was featured in the New York Times, and his forthcoming paper, The Hidden Law of Plea Bargaining, will soon be published in the Columbia Law Review. Professor Crespo's writing also appears in The Boston Globe as well as online at Lawfare, Just Security and Take Care.

Prior to beginning his academic career, Professor Crespo served as a Staff Attorney with the Public Defender Service for the District of Columbia, where he represented adults and juveniles charged with serious felonies, ranging from armed robberies, to burglaries, to homicides. Professor Crespo graduated *magna cum laude* from Harvard Law School in 2008, where he served as president of the Harvard Law Review, the first Latino to hold that position. Following law school, Professor Crespo served for three years as a law clerk, initially to Judge Stephen Reinhardt of the US Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit, then to Associate Justice Stephen Breyer of the US Supreme Court, and finally to Associate Justice Elena Kagan during her inaugural term on the Court.

Cari K. Dawson '93

Cari K. Dawson is a Partner with Alston & Bird LLP. She chairs the Class Action and Multidistrict Litigation Practice Team and has an established track record of successfully defending Fortune 500 companies as lead counsel in high-profile enterprise litigation throughout the United States. Cari was named as one of the top female litigators in the United States by Benchmark Litigation in the publication's 2017 edition of the "Top 250 Women in Litigation," which honors the achievements of female litigators nationwide. She is one of only five female litigators from the state of

Georgia highlighted by Benchmark Litigation. This is the third time Dawson has been recognized by the publication, which offered the following commentary: "Dawson has developed a practice defending hundreds of class actions in a variety of industry sectors. Urs Gasser LL.M. '03

Urs Gasser is the Executive Director of the Berkman Klein Center for Internet & Society at Harvard University and a Professor of Practice at Harvard Law School. His research and teaching activities focus on information law, policy, and society issues and the changing role of academia in the digitally networked age. Current projects – several involving the Global Network of Internet & Society Centers, which he helped to incubate – focus on the governance of evolving and emerging technologies such as Cloud Computing, the Internet of Things, Augmented Reality, and Artificial Intelligence, with a particular interest in privacy and security issues and the broader implications of these technologies, including questions of agency and autonomy. As a longer term research interest, he studies the patterns of interaction between law and innovation, and innovation with the legal system in the digital age.

Dr. Gasser has written and edited several books on digital technology issues, and published over 100 articles in professional journals. He is the co-author of "Born Digital: Understanding the First Generation of Digital Natives" (Basic Books, 2008 and 2016, with John Palfrey), which has been translated into 10 languages (including Chinese), co-author of "Interop: The Promise and Perils of Highly Interconnected Systems" (Basic Books, 2012, with John Palfrey), and author of the forthcoming book "The Future of Digital Privacy: A Navigation Aid" (MIT Press, 2017). In addition to his appointments at Harvard, Urs Gasser is a guest professor at KEIO University (Japan), was a visiting professor at the University of St. Gallen (Switzerland), and taught at Fudan University School of Management (China). He serves as a trustee on the boards of the NEXA Center for Internet & Society at the University of Torino, the Digital Asia Hub, and the Research Center for Information Law at the University of St. Gallen. He was formerly a member of the International Advisory Board of the Alexander von Humboldt Institute for Internet and Society in Berlin, a Fellow at the Gruter Institute for Law and Behavioral Research, and served as a Senior Advisor to the World Economic Forum's Future of the Internet Initiative.

Urs graduated from the University of St. Gallen (lic.iur., Dr.iur.) as well as Harvard Law School (LL.M. '03) and received several academic awards and prizes for his research, including Harvard's Landon H. Gammon Fellowship for academic excellence and the "Walther Hug-Preis Schweiz," a prize for the best doctoral thesis in law nationwide, among others. Before returning to the Berkman Klein Center as Executive Director in 2009, Urs Gasser was an Associate Professor of Law at the University of St. Gallen, where he led the Research Center for Information Law as Faculty Director. Prior to his St. Gallen appointment, Urs spent three years as a resident fellow at the Berkman Klein Center, where he was later appointed Faculty Fellow. He also initiated and chaired the Harvard-Yale-Cyberscholar Working Group, and was a visiting researcher at Harvard Law School.

Karen M. Hardwick '88

Karen Hardwick is a versatile attorney appointed as General Counsel of the University of the District of Columbia in March of 2016. She brings to UDC her nearly 30-year proven track record of solving complex legal problems for both public and private enterprises.

Karen served most recently as the City Attorney and General Counsel for the City of Annapolis, Maryland, the historic municipal corporation with a \$99 million operating budget and \$88 million capital improvement program. As an active member of the mayoral cabinet during her tenure, she helped the city leadership manage changes in city governance, labor and employment, public finance, public works and related legal matters and disputes.

Earlier in her career, Karen was named the Executive Vice President and General Counsel of the District of Columbia's Anacostia Waterfront Development Corporation. Working for the quasi-public enterprise in those capacities, she led the negotiations of an array of complex corporate transactions, crafted optimal legal solutions to mitigate high-stakes policy and operating risks, and provided integral legal and policy support to the board of directors.

As Karen rose to prominence in the District of Columbia legal community, she was tapped by the mayor to join the board of directors for the National Capital Revitalization Corporation (NCRC) and, eventually, appointed to take over as board chair. Under Karen's leadership, NCRC spearheaded a number of iconic economic development initiatives in the District, including the award-winning revitalization of the Columbia Heights neighborhood. As a result of her success with NCRC, Karen was honored with awards from the District of Columbia Chamber of Commerce and the Building Industry Association.

Throughout her career, Karen has been a visible leader of the local business community and not-for-profit initiatives. She has served as a Vice-Chair of the Board of the District of Columbia Chamber of Commerce, as programmatic co-chair for Leadership Greater Washington, and Vice-Chair of the National Black Child Development Institute. Karen continues almost a decade of service as Vice-President of the Washington Children's Foundation, a not-for-profit organization focused on preventing child abuse and funding wrap-around services for victims of child abuse.

Matthew G. Olsen '88

Matt Olsen has served as leading government official on a range of national security, intelligence, and law enforcement issues.

Most recently, Mr. Olsen served for three years as the Director of the National Counterterrorism Center under President Obama. Created by Congress in response to the attacks of September 11, 2001, NCTC is responsible for the integration and analysis of terrorism information and strategic operational planning of counterterrorism activities. Prior to joining NCTC, Mr. Olsen was the General Counsel for the National Security Agency, serving as NSA's chief legal officer and focusing on surveillance law and cyber operations.

Mr. Olsen worked at the Department of Justice in a number of leadership positions. He served as an Associate Deputy Attorney General, responsible for national security and criminal cases. He also was Special Counselor to the Attorney General and Executive Director of the Guantanamo Review Task Force, where he led the review of individuals detained at Guantanamo. Mr. Olsen served as acting Assistant Attorney General for National Security and helped establish the National Security Division.

From 1994 to 2006, Mr. Olsen was a federal prosecutor in the US Attorney's Office for the District of Columbia, prosecuting violent gang members, terrorists, and white collar criminals. Mr. Olsen served as Special Counsel to the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation from 2004 to 2005. He began his public service career as a trial attorney in the Civil Rights Division of the Department of Justice.

Mr. Olsen is a co-founder of IronNet Cybersecurity, a technology firm based in Washington, DC, where he leads business development and strategy. Mr. Olsen is a national security analyst for ABC News, an adjunct senior fellow at the Center for a New American Security, and serves on several senior advisory boards for government agencies. He also is affiliated with the Berkman Klein Center at Harvard, where he helps lead a project on cybersecurity.

Mr. Olsen graduated from Harvard Law School and the University of Virginia and clerked in the US District Court for the District of Columbia.

The Hon. Deval L. Patrick '82

Originally from the South Side of Chicago, Patrick came to Massachusetts at 14, when he was awarded a scholarship to Milton Academy through the Boston-based organization A Better Chance. After Harvard College and Harvard Law School, he clerked for a federal appellate judge and then launched a career as an attorney and business executive, becoming partner at two Boston law firms and a senior executive at Texaco and Coca-Cola. In 1994, President Clinton appointed Patrick to the nation's top civil rights post, Assistant Attorney General for Civil Rights. In 2006, in his first bid for public office, he became the state's first African-American governor. In his two terms as Governor, Patrick oversaw the expansion of affordable health care to more than 98 percent of state residents, launched initiatives stimulating clean energy and biotechnology, won a national Race to the Top grant, and steered the state out of recession to a 25-year high in employment. Patrick currently serves as a Managing Director of Bain Capital Double Impact, where he focuses on investments that deliver both a competitive financial return and significant positive social impact. He is a Rockefeller Fellow, a Crown Fellow of the Aspen Institute, and the author of two books, *A Reason to Believe: Lessons from an Improbable Life* and *Faith in the Dream: A Call to the Nation to Reclaim American Values*.

Richard Pfohl '93

Richard Pfohl is General Counsel to Music Canada, which represents the major international recording companies, and to the Canadian recording industry's principal licensing agency, CONNECT Music Licensing, representing over 2500 artists and recording companies. Richard has also served as President of Re:Sound, which administers the rights of artists and record labels for all online services, performances and broadcasts of music in Canada.

Richard has taught courses on internet, information technology and digital commerce law as an adjunct faculty member of the University of Toronto Law School, and has taught copyright law in the Osgoode Hall Law School LLM and LLB programs. Lacey Schwartz is a co-founder of Truth Aid, a multimedia production company that specializes in fiction and non-fiction stories about telling truths that are hard to talk about. Lacey is a Harvard-trained lawyer and community outreach specialist who uses her interdisciplinary training as the foundation to approach the social issues she has chosen to tackle as an artist and filmmaker. Lacey directed, produced and co-wrote the critically-acclaimed documentary *Little White Lie*, which was the top-rated broadcast on PBS's *Independent Lens* during the 2014-2015 season. Carol S. Steiker '86

Carol Steiker is the Henry J. Friendly Professor of Law and Faculty Co-Director of the Criminal Justice Policy Program at Harvard Law School. She specializes in the broad field of criminal justice, where her work ranges from substantive criminal law to criminal procedure to institutional design, with a special focus on issues related to capital punishment. Recent publications address topics such as the relationship of criminal justice scholarship to law reform, the role of mercy in the institutions of criminal justice, and the likelihood of nationwide abolition of capital punishment. Her most recent book, *Courting Death: The Supreme Court and Capital Punishment*, co-authored with her brother Jordan Steiker of the University of Texas School of Law, was published by Harvard University Press in November 2016.

Professor Steiker is a graduate of Harvard Law School, where she served as president of the Harvard Law Review, the second woman to hold that position in its then 99-year history. After clerking for Judge J. Skelly Wright of the DC Circuit Court of Appeals and Justice Thurgood Marshall of the US Supreme Court, she worked as a staff attorney for the Public Defender Service for the District of Columbia, where she represented indigent defendants at all stages of the criminal process. In addition to her scholarly work, Professor Steiker has worked on pro bono litigation projects on behalf of indigent criminal defendants, including death penalty cases in the US Supreme Court. She also has served as a consultant and expert witness on issues of criminal justice for non-profit organizations and has testified before Congress and state legislatures.

Guhan Subramanian '98

Guhan Subramanian is the Joseph H. Flom Professor of Law and Business at Harvard Law School and the H. Douglas Weaver Professor of Business Law at Harvard Business School. At HLS he teaches courses in negotiations and corporate law. At HBS he teaches in several executive education programs, such as Strategic Negotiations, Changing The Game, Making Corporate Boards More Effective, Mergers & Acquisitions, and the Advanced Management Program. He is the faculty chair for the JD/MBA program at Harvard University and the Vice Chair for Research for the

Harvard Program on Negotiation. Prior to joining the Harvard faculty he spent three years at McKinsey & Company. Professor Subramanian holds degrees in Law, Economics, and Business from Harvard University.

Chris Thorne '93

Chris is an accomplished tech entrepreneur, investor, and McKinsey alumni. He holds three Harvard degrees and has been a frequent speaker at industry events, including China Leaders Forum, AVCJ, and OneMedPlace.

Chris began his career at McKinsey & Company, where he managed strategic and operational engagements for Fortune 500 companies. After serving leadership roles at McKinsey, Chris left the firm to execute his entrepreneurial vision by launching a SaaS (software as a service) company, whose on-demand intelligence solutions create efficiency gains for CPG manufacturers, distributors, and retailers by converting traditional paper-based business processes into paperless electronic transactions throughout the entire value chain. He then initiated a rollup of compatible SaaS companies. The resulting category-leading company received VC-backing from Accel-KKR, managed over \$200 billion in annual transaction volume, and subsequently sold to Roper Industries for greater than a half billion dollars.

Chris also volunteers as a trustee for Creative Commons, the 501(c)(3) nonprofit that promotes educational access, knowledge-sharing, and collaborative research at a global level. Chris received his JD from Harvard Law School, MBA from Harvard Business School, and bachelor's degree, *magna cum laude*, from Harvard University, where he competed in intercollegiate soccer, wrestling, and rugby, served as president of the university-wide student government, and founded the Harvard Negotiation Law Review.

Grigory Vaypan LL.M. '13

Grigory Vaypan is Head of Litigation at the Institute for Law and Public Policy, an independent non-profit organization in Moscow, Russia. Grigory directs strategic human rights litigation before the Constitutional Court of Russia and the European Court of Human Rights. In less than five years since his graduation from Harvard, he has introduced and embedded the practice of amicus curiae submissions before the Constitutional Court of Russia, culminating in a breakthrough amendment to the Court's Rules of Procedure. Prior to his work at Goodwin Procter, Professor Westfahl spent six years leading professional development for the Washington, DC office of McKinsey & Company. He is also an experienced business and federal regulatory attorney, having practiced law with Foley & Lardner's Washington, DC office from 1988 to 1998. Professor Westfahl earned his JD from Harvard Law School in 1988, and graduated *summa cum laude* from Dartmouth College in 1985.

Mike Wiser '03

Mike Wiser has worked on 40 films for the PBS series FRONTLINE since joining the Kirk Documentary Group in 2003.
