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What is a clinic?

Clinics provide students with hands-on legal experience under the supervision of licensed attorneys, who are trained in individually educating and mentoring students. There is a substantive law class connected to each clinic.

Students in clinics gain experience:

- Directly representing clients
- Advocating in court
- Writing amicus briefs
- Shaping public policy and more!

Veterans Law and Disability Benefits Clinic

Clinic students are representing an LGBTQ veteran who was barred from receiving federal VA benefits as a surviving spouse after his disabled partner's death, in a potentially precedent-setting case to secure rights for LGBTQ veterans.



Election Law Clinic

The Election Law Clinic has had a series of wins, most recently in the 11th Circuit Court, in a case against Jacksonville, Florida's City Council, arguing to replace a racially gerrymandered district map that suppressed the impact of Black voters in the city.



International Human Rights Clinic

In Kosovo, the clinic launched a report holding the United Nations accountable for placing hundreds of displaced members of the Roma community in housing where they were exposed to lead poisoning.

Independent Clinical Program

- Secure supervising attorney and faculty sponsor
- Choose a paper topic
- Submit an application to OCP

Clinical Registration

Policies

- One clinic per semester
- Clinical credit maximum: 16

In-House and Externship Clinics

- Preferencing or By Application
- Preferencing lottery process for the following year occurs in late March/early April for rising 2Ls and 3Ls
- Students enter preferences for the entire year fall, winter, and spring terms

By Application Registration

- Clinics that are by application are not included in preferencing
- Each has its own deadline and application process
- Deadlines in spring, summer, and fall

Advanced Clinical Program

- Apply to continue your work with the same clinic across subsequent semesters
- Not a part of clinical registration preferencing

Pro Bono Program

HLS has a strong commitment to community and public service

Students are required to engage in 50 hours of pro bono work before graduation

Pro Bono work can begin first day 1L year. Students have a wide range of opportunities including:

- 11 Student Practice Organizations
- Spring Break pro bono projects
- Individual pro bono placements

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SPO Stories

Prison Legal Assistance Project students represented incarcerated individuals after a 2020 uprising that resulted in false disciplinary reports and physical abuse from corrections officers. Documents and testimony obtained by PLAP helped further a recent federal class action lawsuit brought by Prisoners' Legal Services.



In Spring 2022, a student in the Tenant Advocacy Project won the reinstatement of her client's Section 8 housing voucher during an administrative hearing with the Cambridge Housing Authority, ensuring that the family of 7 remained housed.

Clinics

- > Open to 2Ls and 3Ls
- Join through registration and application process
- Eligible for academic credit and pro bono hours
- Led by faculty, clinical instructors, and lecturers who provide supervision and education

Student Practice Organizations (SPOs)

- Open to 1Ls, 2Ls, and 3Ls
- Join at the beginning of each semester
- Eligible for pro bono hours
- Student-run organizations in conjunction with a supervising attorney

Individual Pro Bono Work

How does it work?

Legal work on an individual and unpaid basis for HLS pro bono credit under the supervision of a licensed attorney

Where can you work?

Non-profits, government agencies, law firms in limited circumstances, or with HLS faculty members who are licensed to practice, inperson and remotely around the world

Where can you find pro bono opportunities? By searching the Public Service section in Helios, Administrative Updates, OCP website listings, or an advising appointment with OCP. Design your own!

Spring Break Pro Bono Trips

When?

In March, for a minimum of 5 days

Where?

Outside and within the Boston area, often response to current events

Competitive process, proposals and applications are due to OCP in the fall

Funding is provided by OCP



Pro Bono Stories

In 2023, students from the Harvard Immigration Project travelled to San Diego, California over spring break to do legal research and work directly with clients at the local detention center, on the border, and in a shelter.



In 2019, students traveled to San Juan, Puerto Rico to work with Corporación ENLACE del Caño Martín Peña, an organization working on environmental restoration and sustainability for the communities surrounding El Caño Martín Peña, a polluted tidal channel at the center of the community.

Office of Clinical and Pro Bono Programs (OCP)

What does OCP do?

- Develops clinical curriculum and manages clinical registration
- Manages externship placements and the Pro Bono Program
- Serves as a resource and advisor for students during their clinical experience
- Responsible for budgetary and management oversight of all clinics and SPOs
- Provides support and assistance to clinics where needed
