WHAT IS TITLE IX?

Title IX is a federal law that protects people from discrimination based on sex in education programs or activities that receive federal funding. Discrimination under Title IX includes sex-based harassment and discrimination.

Harvard University faculty and staff members who are not identified as confidential resources are considered Responsible Employees, and must promptly notify OEO about possible sexual harassment and other sexual misconduct.
